- O praise the Lord, all you nations; praise him, all you peoples.
- For great is his steadfast love towards us, and the faithfulness of the Lord endures for ever.

PRAYER

Gracious God, we praise you for your faithfulness and pray that every nation may find your blessing in the face of Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**

BACKGROUND

The I50 Psalms that make up the Book of Psalms are prayers. They praise God, and they ask God to intercede in the sufferings and pains of his people. When praising, the Psalms not only thank God for his goodness, but affirm who God is and who his people are in the light of this. God is the Good Shepherd and his people are his sheep. When crying out to God to intercede in moments of anguish, the Psalms affirm God's goodness and provision in spite of the people's suffering.

Whatever their circumstances, whether joyful or painful, the Psalms are filled with the sense that God is present with his people.

REFLECTION

For me, Psalm 117, though it is the shortest Psalm by far, encapsulates this idea that through the words of the Psalms God is present with his people.

Because we are God's people, we can confidently use this psalm as a prayer for ourselves. In doing so, we affirm who we are within God's creation remind ourselves of the truth of God's love for us. Whoever we are, wherever we are, in whatever circumstances we find ourselves, we can be assured that God is with us and present in our lives. Through understanding this Psalm for ourselves we are encouraged to pray in the knowledge that we are praying with Christians throughout the world. We are not only affirming who we are in God, but who we are as a precious part of the community of Christians in all places.

In one of the earliest Monastic Rules, written by St. Benedict (c480 - c547 AD) it is prescribed that Monastic Communities say or sing the Book of 150 Psalms in its entirety each week, every week! In Psalm 117's simplicity and shortness, I find it representative of this cycle. Within the Anglican Church we too follow a rhythm; the seasons and festivals of our yearly liturgical cycle, and the Daily Offices of Morning and Evening Prayer. We pray not only within a cycle of prayer that involves the whole Christian Community, but in a cycle of prayer that surrounds us individually in the presence of God.

Tomorrow, 17th March, the Church commemorates St. Patrick, "the Apolstle to the Irish" (c385 - c461), and I find the essence of Psalm 117 present in part of one of his prayers:

Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me.

Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger.

When we surround ourselves in prayer with surround ourselves with the presence of God.
