



FIRST WORD from The Rector

The problem about carrying a smart phone around is that you carry the world in your pocket. All life seems to be there. I can shop or do my banking 24/7; I can check on the hour to hour weather forecast for Paris, New York, Delhi, and Nempnet Thrubwell; I can find my way around the world by Google Maps and message all my

friends on social media at any moment. I can buy a car at 3.00am in the morning, and get the latest moment by moment commentary on any item of news I care to follow. I can take films and photos and send them instantly and get my emails – many of them – all the time. If I'm quick off the mark I can even fumble around enough to answer a phone call.

But darker currents lie beneath all this opportunity. I don't think we ought to blame technology for the world's woes but the unfiltered misinformation these things spew out can be genuinely caustic to mental health – not least the relentless information about suicide, extremism, radicalisation, polarisation, knife crime and gang culture, environmental degradation and war. All of these things, and more, stir up division, mistrust, hatred and conflict. If we can find the world in our pocket then at times we must wonder what sort of a world it is becoming and giving up a smart phone for lent may be a good start for this season.

This accelerating division and hatred is, of course, the spiritual background to Easter.

Easter isn't simply the story of one person, it's the story of a new community who strive to live in a new way. One of the most striking elements of the Easter story is the unshakeable conviction of the disciples and their emerging church in the resurrection – that Christ had died on the cross, somehow carrying the burden of the world's darkness, but that God had raised him to life revealing the resurrection not just for one individual but for us all. From its very first day the church grew on this foundation. The church became a "community of the resurrection", as Paul would say, "if anyone is in Christ the old has gone, behold the new has come" and the remarkable conclusion of the resurrection is that "there is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male or female; for all of you are one in Christ."

This is the reconciling reality of the resurrection. The new community of faith, the church, was and is called upon to reflect the values, the faith and the life of the

Kingdom where all find a place. The old barriers are to be taken away as the resurrection heals, restores and forgives all that needs healing, restoration and forgiveness. The disciples, a mixed bag of devotion, fear, failure and loyalty, all came to this extraordinary awareness – that God had raised Jesus from death which blew away all their fear and confusion and with courage and confidence they began their new community of the resurrection – a community of hope and faith.

The divisions which we see all too clearly in the world are, therefore, not just pieces of bad news. They are actually a denial of the resurrection – a sort of refutation of Easter. Easter breaks barriers and creates reconciliation which stands in stark contrast to the evil divisions we witness.

Easter is not just a story about a happy ending, nor less some cleverly invented myth but an extraordinary awareness of the life of God made known in Christ. So every time we see a reconciliation, every time we see an act of forgiveness, every time we see fear replaced by hope – then these things reflect something of Easter. And we, in the church, in the community of the resurrection, are called upon to practice and to live out this hope.

Easter allows us to put something positive into the world. There is much to celebrate and much which is good, but in these troubled times as the world's woes come to us so powerfully, we can celebrate how the darkness of cruelty, lies and corruption was healed and restored by goodness, truth and faith which the church is called upon to live by still. We may at times carry the world in our pocket but we can carry Christ in our hearts who has overcome the world.

Alleluia Christ is risen;

He is risen indeed, alleluia.

Bishop Guli Francis-Dehqani

A prayer for the people of Iran

Lord Jesus Christ, We hold before you the people of Iran. May the tears shed in your earthly life Be balm for all who weep, And may the prayers of your pilgrimage Give strength to all who suffer, For your mercy's sake. Amen.

Prayer for Anglicans in Iran

Ever living God, Whose Church is strengthened by the blood of the martyrs, We thank you for the witness of the Anglican Church in Iran And pray for the faithful remnant who endure. In suffering, sustain them; In fragility, nurture them; In isolation, surround them with your love. May we see your presence in the small and the vulnerable, For the bruised reed you do not break, nor the smouldering wick snuff out. Renew us, and the persecuted Church, in the message of hope Shown in the death and resurrection of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Bishop Guli Francis-Dehqani was born in Isfahan, Central Iran, the youngest of four children to Hassan Dehqani-Tafti, the first ethnic Iranian Anglican Bishop of Iran. In 1980, in the wake of the Islamic Revolution, Guli and her family were forced to flee the country after being targeted by the regime. She arrived in the UK as a refugee aged just 13. She has been unable to set foot in Iran since.

Bishop Guli attended Clarendon School in Bedfordshire, where she met and became friends with our very own Kate Hector. A friendship that continues to this day, Kate and Guli being part of the fabric of each others lives, having lived near each other in London and even working alongside each other in religious broadcasting at the BBC. Guli has been to East Clevedon and has even stayed at the Rectory

In November 2017, in wondrous circularity, she was consecrated as a Bishop, making her the first woman from a minority ethnic background to be ordained as an Anglican Bishop.

She is the current Bishop of Chelmsford and is the lead Bishop for Housing for the Church of England.

As we journey through the season of Lent, in light of ongoing world events, with increasing tension between America and Iran, the Middle East more riven than ever and the subject of refugees once more in the headlines here at home; I felt it apposite to remember the ordinary people of Iran and all those who suffer persecution and oppression.

Bishop Guli's story remind us to welcome the stranger and not be tempted to turn our back on those in need.

In uncertain times, when our faith may be tested, Guli's prayers highlight our responsibility to all who suffer and remind us of the Gospel message of hope, and reassure us that nothing we face can separate us from the love of God.

LETTER FROM THE BISHOP

New life for all the world

Sowing seeds, chitting potatoes, choosing varieties. Easter acts as starter's orders for the gardening year. Beds are

cultivated, lawns mown, plans for all the growth and new life that spring and summer will bring made and then turned into action.

There's a much greater connection between gardening and Easter than it merely being the time to dust off forks and spades. For in the Bible, a garden is the setting for Easter itself. In John's Gospel (Jn 20:1-18) Mary Magdalene meets the risen Jesus in a garden. Indeed, Jesus's appearance to Mary is so unexpected that at first she can't believe it's really him. So she mistakes the man she meets 'supposing him to be the gardener' (John 20:15).

In John's account, all the new life contained in the first Easter chimes with a much earlier story set in a garden too. This is of the new life of another man and woman, the creation story of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden and contained in the book of Genesis (Genesis 2:4- 3:24). In that story, Adam is the gardener (Gen 2:15), only for things to go wrong. In John, Jesus is portrayed as the new Adam – come to bring new life that has no end.

What would happen if we were to think of our churches as gardens, primed to welcome the spring that is the new life of Jesus this Easter? What would happen if we imagined ourselves called to be gardeners – like our father Adam and the new Adam, Jesus? What would we expect to grow? What might need pruning or weeding? What new plans for the coming season would we make and turn into action? What would be the harvest that we'd sow for, tend and then reap?

For I reckon we should see Easter as the starting point of all that God wants to do among us and with us. Jesus's resurrection opens us to being part of God's new creation. Easter offers us a fresh start for life, relationships and the life of our churches: new life for all the world.

Happy gardening and a very Happy Easter to you all.

from the archives

THE QUIET DAY AT EAST CLEVEDON

We are requested to state that the notice required to be given to the Vicar, before the 20th inst.[20th May], applied to those only who intend to preserve the continuity of the day by attending the common meals (at which readings are given in lieu of conversation). Any persons, therefore, can avail themselves of the services, addresses, instruction, &c., but those only who have given due notice can attend the common meals, except by payment of 2s 6d. The day being a Rogation Day, the meals (by the Church's order) will be very simple and all *maigre* [meatless], the cost being defrayed from the offertory at 8 and 10.30 a.m. *Clevedon Mercury, May 25th 1889*

*The Vicar at this point was the Revd. John Vicars Foot (later John Vicars-Foote), who succeeded Father Stephen Henry Saxby, in 1887. Appointed by the Eltons, who had the gift of the living, and married to an Elton niece, his incumbency turned into a disaster. First he sued his curate, unsuccessfully, and then he sued Sir Edmund Elton and the Rev. John Lawson of St. John's Church. Once again he lost and in both cases the verdict was that the action should never have been brought. After several unhappy years, when the parish split into factions, he issued the choir and orchestra in 1898 with brass knuckledusters in case of attack by the Kensitites, an extreme Protestant sect, and the Bishop almost immediately forced his resignation.



Garden Talk

It is time to get snipping. Many shrubs will benefit from a haircut in March and some require more drastic treatment. Lavender, rosemary, santolina and similar plants should be treated gently – avoid cutting into old wood which will probably not regenerate. Old shrub roses do not need to be pruned unless they have got too big, and climbing and rambling roses should be pruned only lightly. Hybrid teas and floribundas, on the other hand, can be cut down to a few inches from the ground.

Talking of roses reminds me of so-called 'hobby plants'. Some gardeners specialize in just one genus, and we had a good example of that last month with Geoff Mitchell's excellent article on sweet peas. When we lived in lower Clevedon, with its thick clay soil, I specialized in roses and was looking forward to creating a nice display in our present home at the top of the town. But, alas, they hate our light, stony soil; they get blackspot from July onwards and look a mess. So now I grow only shrub roses which can flourish in our conditions.

Then about three years ago I bought some salvias at Weston-in-Gordano's celebrated plant sale. They had been raised by Geoff and looked very attractive. Our resident snails thought so too and it wasn't long before they had all gone. Some time later I attended a coffee morning at St Mary's where another salvia plant was on sale for a modest sum. It had been raised by Mary Pope (do the clergy realize how many keen gardeners we have in the Benefice?). This plant has narrow leaves and does not seem to be palatable to slugs and snails. It flourished in our garden and I took a cutting which also grew well.

This was the start of my Salvia Phase. They are amazing plants and love our light, free draining soil. They bloom continuously from mid-summer until November, they are drought tolerant and cuttings take remarkably easily. But now I have a confession to make. Coming up Clevedon's Zig-Zag one day I saw a bright blue salvia within easy reach. True blue is unusual in garden plants; many so-called blue flowers are really purple. On the 7th February, after a period of reflection, All Saints' PCC considered the report on same sex marriages known as "Living in Love and Faith". The Church of England, together with the Roman Catholic Church, has recently approved resources and prayers for the pastoral support and blessing of same sex couples. These prayers are to be used in a pastoral context and are not marriages – they are prayers for those already married in a register office or similar. The law recognises same sex civil marriages and although the church teaching and understanding of marriage hasn't changed (one man, one woman for life) the legal and social context of marriage and human sexuality has changed radically. Recognising these changes and the Church's provision in this report, the PCC unanimously approved these resources for use at All Saints expressly wishing to be a welcoming and inclusive church for all. The PCC is aware that views can vary markedly on this issue and that not everyone is likely to agree, but the Bishop charged all Incumbents and PCCs to consider opting into these resources and we have willingly chosen to do so.
