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

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FIRST WORD from The Rev'd Tim Dapyln

I am writing this against a backdrop of destruction and disaster arising from the earthquakes of Monday 6th February that occurred in Southern Turkey and the rising toll of deaths and casualties also affecting Northern Syria. As well as the bravery of the rescuers and the urgency of the efforts of relief agencies, people everywhere, of all faiths and none, have turned to God for answers and solace in our shock and grief.

That we appeal to God in times of tragedy and stress is not new nor should it be surprising. As 'a person of faith' however I am puzzled that we seem to wait until a crisis has actually occurred before we turn to God. I suppose that there are many reasons why we seem to wait. We humans are rather fickle beings and undoubtedly God can be used as a kind of gap filler – a form of divine Polyfilla, if you like. Whenever we are faced with that which cannot satisfactorily be explained; when we are faced with situations which seem beyond human help; when we can feel that human resources are inadequate, we have a tendency to call God in. He fills the gap. There rises to the surface an inborn feeling that somehow, somewhere, there is a God who may be able to help. There is also a tendency, which must be admitted, that once the crisis is over God is forgotten again and our good resolves broken.

I may regret this attitude but I don't condemn it out of hand. If God is not to be found in the tragedies and stresses of life then he is not God. One of the comforting things in the New Testament is the way in which Jesus meets the needs of many people suffering from personal tragedy and they don't appear to be particularly religious people. Maybe one of the reasons why people wait until such a time is the picture of God presented by the Church which doesn't always inspire them to see him active in the whole of life's experiences.

I think that we ought in one way to be thankful that people do turn to God and rather than question their motives try to use this action creatively. Here is a starting point, at the least, to help them to a realisation that God isn't the supreme gap-filler but the Reality at the centre of every aspect of life.

'We have this treasure in earthen vessels', says St Paul, referring to the life God graciously gives to us. But earthen vessels break very easily, we know. Tragedy can come with an awful suddenness breaking into pieces our hopes and our joys. But the Christian message is that God is there just as he is when things are going well. To turn to him, while it may seem fickle to humans if he has been almost ignored before, does not go without his loving response.

Of course we should not wait for tragedy or stress to strike. But some do and I believe that they can expect no less than God's love and his mercy. Our prayer must be that they will come to know as a result, that God is the God of their joy

too. It is never to late to turn to the Lord as the thief next to him on the cross discovered. And there have been some pretty impressive testimonies of many since then. Their message to us is: do not wait too long for you are already missing out on so much.

Pause for Thought

Christ Has No Body...

Christ has no body but yours,
No hands, no feet on earth but yours,
Yours are the eyes with which he looks
Compassion on this world,
Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good,
Yours are the hands, with which he blesses all the world.
Yours are the hands, yours are the feet,
Yours are the eyes, you are his body.
Christ has no body now but yours,
No hands, no feet on earth but yours,
Yours are the eyes with which he looks
compassion on this world.
Christ has no body now on earth but yours.

This meaningful poem speaks powerfully of an individual and collective calling to be both the physical and spiritual body of Christ at work in the world.

The lines are often attributed to St Teresa of Avila (1515–1582) but they are much more likely to be the work of multiple and more modern authors. Methodist minister Mark Guy Pearse (1842-1930), Quaker medical missionary Sarah Elizabeth Rowntree and her cousin John Wilhelm Rowntree (1868-1905) all quoted and may have expanded on the poem's theme in their preaching and writing.



When we hoe a field

When we hoe a field, we all start in this corner and we go this way' is my favourite Zambian proverb. I've been sharing its words with people from our parishes, schools and chaplaincies as a way of inviting us all to think about how our diocesan vision can be refreshed and

developed to help us look towards the future with confidence and joy.

Our vision calls us to 'live and tell the story of Jesus'. It speaks of faith in action. It makes clear that all we do is in the name of Jesus. And it's full of aspiration; living out its words is a life-long task.

But what might our vision mean in terms of what we'd like to focus on specifically? This is where my Zambian proverb comes in. For my sense is that in our common life we would be strengthened if we had a greater focus of what we're all working towards together.

To help us think about this, I'm suggesting four themes that I hope we can all get behind. The aim is not to generate a new initiative, rather it's to identify priorities for our common life upon which we can all focus. Our diverse communities of course mean that anything we do needs to fit local contexts. But I hope the four themes can provide a common framework that will help us all.

Under our overall vision of 'living and telling the story of Jesus', the themes are: (1) Valuing and cherishing the people we already have, (2) Offering worship and sharing our faith together in new and different ways, (3) Developing our own faith and the faith of others. (4) Sharing in ministry and leadership.

I'm inviting everyone to have their say about how these could be developed, adapted or altered. Please do speak with each other and your local church, school and chaplaincy leaders about how this can happen where you are. More information to enable feedback is available at bathandwells.org.uk/vision.

Please be part of the conversation! Your insights, thoughts and experience are invaluable in helping us think together what it means to 'live and tell the story of Jesus'.

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
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Garden Talk

March Manyweathers is as unpredictable as its country name suggests. For us gardeners it is both exciting and frustrating. One day it is sunny and surprisingly warm and so we give our spades and trowels a polish all ready for an afternoon's gardening. By lunch time, however, the east wind has got up, the grey clouds are gathering and it looks like snow. In March, it is said, you can have all four seasons in one day.

Although the weather may be unreliable, one thing is quite certain: on or around 21 March the sun will cross the celestial equator and shine at ever-increasing altitudes in the northern hemisphere. Already plants will be responding to the stronger light. The first bulbs, aconites, crocuses and snowdrops will already have flowered to be followed in March by Muscari (grape hyacinths) and, of course, daffodils. These lovely flowers are the essence of early spring and there are so many varieties to choose from. Tall varieties, such as 'Rijnveld's Early Sensation' and 'Sweetness', both over a foot in height, can be planted behind 'Jack Snipe' (10in) or 'Topolino' (8in) to create a wave of colour. There is even a pink daffodil, 'Pink Wonder', but I would not encourage anyone to plant that! Besides bulbs, flowering shrubs also get in on the act in March. Our Daphne odora has inconspicuous pink flowers but a wonderful scent, our self-sown flowering currants (Ribes sanguineum) create a cheerful display in both front and back gardens, and Sally's Magnolia stellata provides a touch of the exotic to what is basically a humble plot. Welcome as these shrubs are, for me it is the ubiquitous forsythia, with its striking yellow flowers, which announces beyond doubt that spring has really come.

Towards the end of the month you might consider planting your first early potatoes in the ground or a container. The traditional day for this is Good Friday (7 April this year) but there are other ways to test whether the ground is ready. Some gardeners plant radishes as their first root crop; if they flourish it means the soil is warm enough for potatoes, carrots and onions. If the radishes look sick wait a week or two and try again. However, the time-honoured country way is to test the soil with one's bare bottom. If it feels comfortable go ahead and sow your potatoes and may you have a fine crop.

Recently two members of Little saints had birthdays and to celebrate the children were joined by some special guests! They were very excited, and loved singing all their favourite songs with them.


We were even treated to a slice of yummy birthday cake!

What is your "Ministry"?

You may be forgiven for thinking that "ministry" is the preserve of the clergy, lay readers or those "up front" with leadership roles in our churches. You may feel you don't have much to contribute or that your interests, skills and abilities aren't relevant or suitable within the church context. But here's the thing, "Ministry" is not just about preaching, taking services, leading prayers and worship (although it's all these things as well); it's about living our lives in creative collaboration with God, or put another way, using our God-given skills and interests and sharing them with others.

You may well be familiar with the Bible passage from Romans about the body of Christ. It talks of each of us making up part of the body with different functions all of which are valid and important in their own different ways.

I heard a story recently of a Christian woman who was severely disabled, spending all her waking hours in a wheel chair. Each day she prayed for her family, friends, church and the world. Despite her physical limitations she was able to use the gift of intercession (praying for others) as her ministry.

So what is your "Ministry"? Do you make a really good cup of tea, do you enjoy organising, cleaning, are you someone who encourages others through a smile, a kind word or a phone call, or maybe it's maintenance, gardening, catering, administration, finances. Very often it's those things we enjoy most that we can naturally offer to use within the church; it could be your creativity through craft, flowers, music, working with children and young people, visiting the sick or housebound. The list is wide ranging and varied and there will be many more that could be added.

For my own part, over the years I have been involved with the children's ministries at All Saints and St Mary's, I co-ordinate intercessions at All Saints, I'm on the tea rota, I co-ordinate and run (with a team) the Little Saints group for pre-school children and their carers and I run a monthly discussion group (Coffee, cake and conversation) which is based at All Saints. During the pandemic, like many people my life was in transition and likewise for Sandra Sallis who had been the Parish Secretary for many years. It was during this time that Sandra reduced her hours before fully retiring, whilst I moved into the role (on a part time basis).

There are, however, times and seasons in our lives; times when we can give more and times when we may be restricted by, for example, family or work commitments or ill health, when we may be grateful for the support of others. The point is, if

The kitchen needs a proper sorting as does the tower, including going through all the Christmas decorations and there is work to be done in the churchyard as well. There will be hotdogs as a reward for your kind efforts.

Then on Sunday 5th at 11.15am we have our annual Thanksgiving Service. Join us so that the Church can say 'thank you' to you all for your wonderful, continuing support for all that we do here at St. Paul's. Sue will be giving us a roundup of the Church's finances by the means of 'cake'o'nomics' — a big, big cake divided to represent the financial outgoings for last year. The service will be followed by lunch including a slice of cake.
