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

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FIRST WORD from The Rector

It will take wiser heads than mine to fathom the conflict in Israel and Gaza. Writing just days after the terrorist attacks on so many innocent people, "Israel's 911" as it is being called, one is again staggered by the inhumanity and brutality visited upon the innocent by motivated extremists.

But then again, one is staggered by the celebrations which have been seen in London and other British cities, apparently glorying in the death, terror and destruction which Hamas has wrought. These are people living in this country, surrounded by the rule of law, yet celebrating evil. One wonders how it's possible. Perhaps the Home Secretary was right to say that multiculturalism has failed if such attitudes can thrive here at home.

Of course, the result of these terrorist outrages will be a large scale military response from Israel and the conflict will go on. Perhaps that's the aim of Hammas, to create instability across a wider area, enabling nations who have no liking for "the international rules based order" to gain advantage. Perhaps we see the hand of Iran, and indeed other nations, keen to add to the instability.

But on a more intimate level I wonder what the children who witness these events must think? I wonder how they will see the world and the fighting for survival which they must endure. The Old Testament asserts that wrongdoing reverberates down the generations, "to our fathers' fathers" and beyond. It's little wonder that tensions across national, ethnic or religious boundaries can fester for generations when this is what children learn.

The roots of this conflict, of course, go back a long way. In an immediate sense it goes back to the aftermath of the First World War and the desire at the Paris Peace Conference to establish a settled land for the dispersed Jewish people. This gathered energy and pace in the 30s as the Nazis ratcheted up their violent and murderous oppression of the Jews when many thousands of Jewish people emigrated to Palestine. The British had a mandate to govern the area, and so had a guiding hand in the establishment of Israel after the Second World War. The horror of the holocaust made the necessity of a Jewish homeland all the more urgent. Since then, as the Jewish state has grown and as Arab Palestinians were removed from their homes to create space for the new population, so the animosity between the Jewish people and the Palestinians has been allowed to develop. The complexity of this situation is made significantly more so by the 1979 revolution in Iran and the inflamed hatreds towards Israel and the West it fosters.

But the roots of the conflict surely go back even further. Our Bible tells of conflicts almost too numerous to number between Israel, Egypt, Iran, Iraq and Syria. In

church we still speak of the "Holy Land" and the faith is replete with God's promises to his chosen people to occupy the land for ever, but the same land has been conquered and fought over for millennia. Who knows how or when this latest strife will end.

But evil must be resisted and a government's first duty is to keep it's citizens safe. That was the case in 1939 and it is still the case in the face of barbaric terrorism. So there will be more fighting even as we hope and pray for justice and for peace. As we gather for Remembrance Sunday, therefore, we will have sobering reminders of conflicts present and past. The conflicts of Israel and Ukraine are uppermost in our minds, but there are other lesser known conflicts in Africa, Asia and the Middle East, all of which will have their historical roots and their immediate acute causes and each of them will involve the same suffering and plays for power.

There is a classical motto, widely copied, that "if you want peace, prepare for war". In other words, peace is not kept by weakness but by strength. Most of us would agree. A Putin or an Isis or Hamas terrorist thrives of perceived weakness and the sorry tale of human history has borne this out many times. Remembrance Sunday, therefore, also gives us the chance of giving thanks for our armed forces, and those who support them, for they are in many ways the keepers of our peace. But Christ was a peacemaker of a different stripe. He never engaged in violence nor encouraged or advocated it. He prayed for his enemies and taught his disciples to do the same. He was committed to confronting violence and conflict with grace and truth but refused to retaliate. In such a way he tried to reduce conflict, find resolution with justice, and offer a better way. Remembrance Sunday gives this opportunity too – to pray for justice and peace and to encourage the powerful to seek it. Peace is maintained by strength - moral, cultural, spiritual, economic and military. Freedom, tolerance and the rule of law need to be defended just as much now as ever before and now is a time for strength across our whole Christian culture.

On this Remembrance Sunday we look afresh at the horrors of conflict today and remember those of former years. The key to understanding Remembrance is that it isn't an occasion for glorifying war nor of a nostalgia of times past, but an opportunity to commit ourselves to the values which make for human thriving, peace and service in the conviction that goodness is stronger than evil. Christ is the very personification of that goodness of God who taught of a peace which passes our understanding. It is a time for moral and spiritual strength.

Let us hope and pray for that.

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Pause for Thought

The Prayer of St BENEDICT of NURSIA (480 - 547)

O gracious and holy Father,
Give us wisdom to perceive you,
a mind to understand you,
diligence to seek you,
patience to wait for you,
a heart to meditate on you,
and a life to proclaim you,
through the power of your Son,
Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

St Benedict was born in Nursia, modern day Norcia in Umbria, in 480, and died at the Monastery he founded at Monte Cassino in 547. His father was a wealthy Roman nobleman. Benedict had a twin sister, St Scholastica, whom Gregory the Great says was also dedicated to God from a young age.

Saint Benedict was a Christian monk, writer, and theologian who is venerated in all the mainstream Christian traditions. His lasting gift to the Church was his 'Rule', which has a unique spirit of moderation and reasonableness, unlike the harsh, hair-shirt Rules of some early communities. It comprises 73 short chapters. These focus on how to live a Christ-centred life and how to run a monastery efficiently. He encourages people to be obedient and humble, and explains what to do when a member of the community is not, reflecting his own gentle and disciplined nature.

Benedict's Rule played an enormously significant role in the creation and development of monastic communities and he is regarded as the founder of Western Christian monasticism. In 2008 Pope Benedict XVI said "St Benedict exercised a fundamental influence on the development of European civilization and culture", which helped Europe emerge from the "dark night of history" that followed the fall of the Roman empire. My Godfather was a Benedictine monk at Nashdom Abbey, and whenever I stayed there I loved the atmosphere of communal peace, holiness and welcome.

This prayer begins by showing his reverence for God, and goes on to encourage all Christians to persevere in developing a personal relationship with their Creator and Redeemer. He wrote, "Let nothing be preferred to the work of God," meaning that everyone is called to a life of holiness and honest endeavour, thereby building up both the individual and the community. As we daily witness horrendous stories of avoidable sadness and tragedy,in our TV news bulletins, there has never been a more important time to steep ourselves in God's Love and Peace, so we too can become channels of that Peace, to quote his compatriot St Francis.

LETTER FROM THE BISHOP

Time to re-member

I am shortly leaving Bath and Wells for a time to serve as interim Acting Diocesan Bishop in the Diocese of Coventry. You may know that the city of Coventry saw some very heavy shelling during World War 2, which resulted in the destruction of the Cathedral. A new Cathedral has since been built and stands

alongside the old ruin as a testament of hope. Though different in style, there's a harmony of old and new. It shows us where conflict can destroy, peace can be found as we seek to live together as the people of God.

This marrying of modern and traditional styles of architecture, helps us to consider how we fashion the life we are called to live as Christians in our communities. It is not that we put aside our differences nor require others to conform to our own shape or form. Rather we recognise the value of listening fully to others and learn to hear the voice of God. Determining to value the worth of each contribution and discerning together a faithful walk with God.

This season of Remembrance encourages us to look back and to value the contributions of those who have gone before us, giving their lives in the service of others. It is not about glorifying the concept of war and conflict but the desire to establish a peaceful world for all. As we look back, so we are invited to look forward and commit to establishing a world where all have a place and where the Prince of Peace, Jesus, is our example.

Coventry is the home to the Community of the Cross of Nails. A community of reconciliation based around the cross fashioned by iron nails found within the ruins of the Cathedral following the fire. Its mission is to live out the practice of peace-building, encouraging people across the world to learn to be reconciled with themselves and one another, as they find reconciliation with God, through Christ. As I leave here, I do so with plenty of memories, many happy, occasionally sad. Often the latter are those where I have got things wrong and failed to live up to my calling to be the grace-filled child of God I long to be. So, if I have let you down, I am sorry and please pray for me, as I will for you, that God continues to reconcile us to Himself and to one another.

And as we hold our acts of remembrance this month, may we become remembered (put back together), as the people of God.

ALL SAINTS THEN AND NOW

from the archives

CONSECRATION OF ALL SAINTS' CHURCH - The ceremony of consecrating this church took place on Thursday [1st November], by Lord Auckland, Bishop of Bath and Wells. His lordship arrived about ten o'clock, and proceeded to Clevedon court, where he was joined by about thirty clergymen belonging to the town and neighbourhood, amongst whom were the Revds. William N. Peddar (vicar of Clevedon), G.W. Braikenridge, Thos. Bliss, E.H. Fothergill, J. Acres (incumbent of Kenn), H. Ludway (Walton-in-Gordano), C.F. Norman (Portishead), E.O. Tyler (Portbury), Prebendary Symes (rural dean, Cleve), Prebendary Ommaney (rural dean, Chew Magna), Prebendary Millward (Paulton), F. Brown (Nailsea), George O. Smyth Pigott (Kingston Seymour), F. Elwell (Weston-super-Mare), &c. A procession was formed, and entered the church by the west door. The ceremony of consecration was then proceeded with, the prayers being said by the Rev. S.H. Saxby (the appointed incumbent), and the lessons read by the Rev. G.W. Braikenridge and the Rev. F. Brown. The Bishop was assisted in the Communion service by Prebendaries Ommaney and Symes. His Lordship took his text and preached a very eloquent and impressive sermon from Ephesians ii., verses 20 and 21.* At the conclusion of the service, his Lordship and the clergy walked in procession and consecrated the burial ground. On leaving the church the Bishop proceeded to Clevedon Court, where refreshments had been provided. The church, which has been erected solely at the expense of Sir Arthur and Lady Elton, is situate in the pretty valley lying between Sir Abraham's and Strawberry Hills, and has been pronounced to be one of the most complete and tasteful edifices in the county. It consists of a nave (with side aisles), two transepts, chancel, and choir, with central tower and steeple. Mr. Giles of Taunton and London, was the architect. The carving, which is very beautiful, was executed by Mr. Bennett, of Portishead. Messrs. Palmer and Green of Clevedon were the contractors for the masonry and carpentry work. Bristol Daily Post, 6th November 1860.

*And are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone; In whom all the building fitly framed together growth unto an holy temple in the Lord.

Francis Ford found this newspaper clipping amongst his papers and suggested it would make a good parish magazine piece for the month of our patronal festival.

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
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Garden Talk

Most gardens are ready for their winter sleep in November, but before bedding them down there are a few jobs that it is well to do.

I Protect tender and half hardy plants. Most plants will stand a bit of frost but a frost which lasts throughout the day is usually lethal to zonal geraniums (pelargoniums), dahlias, tender fuchsias and many others. Remember that in winter the air temperature is usually higher than the temperature at ground level and it is a

ground frost which your plants will have to cope with. The combination of cold and wet is particularly bad so if your tender plants are not too big trim off the top growth and pot them up. Put them somewhere frost free, light, but not warm to encourage them to rest. Dahlia corms can be lifted and dried off and stored somewhere dark and frost free until spring.

- **2 Collect fallen leaves to make leaf mould.** If you did this last autumn you should already have some excellent leaf mould for the garden. Now is the time to make some more for next year. Most leaves from deciduous trees will rot down if put in a leaf cage they are easy to make with four stout stakes and a length of chicken wire but avoid sycamore leaves which, as I discovered last year, produce myriads of seedlings in the spring. Leaf mould mixed one to one with garden soil will make compost better than you can buy at the garden centre, all at no cost.
- **3 Trim shrubs and hedges.** It is a good idea to cut back the summer growth before the winter gales. Roses can be lightly pruned to minimize root rock, ready for a more drastic pruning in March. Always try to cut out dead wood which will enable light and air to reach the centre of the plant. Do not, however, cut back winter flowering shrubs such as camellias and viburnums so you do not spoil their moment of glory.
- **4 Plant tulips.** November is the ideal month to plant tulip bulbs for a lovely display in the spring. I strongly recommend choosing a Darwin variety because these will come back year after year. Plant your bulbs quite deep, at least three inches, and watch out for squirrels. And plant them pointed end up I know it's obvious but it is easy to forget. Happy autumn gardening!

The 3C's visit to LIFE bookshop

LIFE bookshop was established twelve years ago by former architect Andrew and Lydia Williams. Over this time they have built up the business selling books and Christian resources to parishes and individuals, but it is still a small enterprise and struggles to compete with online bookshops.

Small groups from churches are able to visit the shop and can (in advance) choose from a range of presentation themes each with interactive elements.

Our discussion group (Coffee, Cake and Conversation aka the 3C's) chose 'Which translation of the Bible is most accurate'. Andrew showed us a Bible written in Hebrew and Greek, and then talked us through subsequent translations; an early modern English translation by William Tyndale, a complete modern English translation by Myles Coverdale, the King James version right the way through to New International Version and more colloquial versions. The original Hebrew is technically the most accurate although there wasn't time for an extensive discussion, but there was a chance for questions at the end.

The afternoon was rounded off by a very unexpected afternoon tea with delicious homemade cakes brought out on cake stands and tea served in china cups and saucers. A real treat!

It was an interesting and thought-provoking afternoon and we all came away with things to mull over. Andrew and Lydia showed us enormous hospitality for which we were most grateful.

What is your "Ministry"?

Phil Joyner - St Michaels, Clapton

A bit about me

OK I am now 80 years old having lived with my dear wife Sue at Clapton-In-Gordano for the last 48 years. I left building school at the age of 17 and commenced training as a Surveyor. As was the custom in those days I attended day release and evening classes to obtain the necessary qualifications. I have throughout my life retained my simple faith which started with the influence of my father as a young child.

What brought me to the Benefice?

I was moved by the public construction company from Manchester to Bristol in the early 1970's. We settled into our home Rose Cottage with our two children Luke and Joanne who both attended the faith primary school at Portbury. So our early family life was centred around Portbury. Sue spent many years on the school PTA whilst I became an assistant leader in the local cub pack and remained with the scout movement for a further 30 years.

My role in the Benefice

Some 15 years or so ago I joined the Friends of St Michaels Group formed in the mid 90's when the village church was declared redundant and put into the Churches Conservation Trust. With excellent support from other members of the committee we managed to keep our church alive due to the considerable support from the pastural team at All Saints. Our programme of events and services has been watered down following covid. Nevertheless, we remain confident that we should and must retain this village place of worship that has been in existence since 1226.

I am a regular at 8 o'clock holy communion at All Saints and enjoy a peaceful start to my week.
